**SAIC TO PRESENT INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF CHIEFS OF
POLICE (IACP) AWARD HONORING OUTSTANDING LAW
ENFORCEMENT VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS**

(SAN DIEGO) – Nov. 4, 2008 - Science Applications International Corporation [NYSE:SAI] announced today that together with the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), it will present the Outstanding Achievement in Law Enforcement Volunteer Programs Award this week to law enforcement agencies with outstanding law enforcement volunteer programs. The winners of this year's award are the police departments of Delray Beach, Fla.; Richardson, Texas; and the City of Benicia, Calif.

The IACP manages and implements the VIPS Program in partnership with and on behalf of the White House Office of the USA Freedom Corps, Citizen Corps and the Bureau of Justice Assistance, U.S. Department of Justice. The program was established as one of the Citizen Corps programs under the USA Freedom Corps initiative created by President George W. Bush in 2002. These programs share the common goal of helping communities prevent, prepare for and respond to crime, natural disasters and other emergencies.

“This award gives us an opportunity to applaud innovative and successful volunteer programs that make our communities safer,” said Ronald C. Ruecker, IACP president and director of public safety for the City of Sherwood, Oregon. “This year’s winners are excellent examples of the value of volunteers to law enforcement agencies and the communities they serve.”
